More than 200 people gathered in Vancouver, B.C., this week to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the victim-centred approach to sex offender management that emerged from the work of Dr. Lois Gaunt. This approach is based on the belief that, regardless of the offence or circumstance of sexual offending, there is something common among these offenders that can be understood, reduced and ultimately, cured. As I sat and listened to Dr. Gaunt's husband, Tim, celebrate her life and legacy, I was struck by how much of what he said was similar to the story I'd just been told by a front-line sex offender management worker. In other words, the speaker who sat before me this week was reflecting on the community response to the man who murdered Dr. Gaunt, Thomas Menard. What happened to Lois? Dr. Gaunt, who died of cancer in 1998, was the guiding force behind Vancouver's sex offender program. It was a program that provided offenders with education, skills training, counseling and therapeutic and social services to reduce their risk of reoffending and, when necessary, to help them get reintegrated into society. Lois Gaunt advocated for the inclusion of the voices of sexual assault victims, testifying before the B.C. government to urge changes in the process by which convicted sex offenders were released into the community.
