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Nations has called a growing global problem. The data shows fewer than a third of reported cases are followed up, in a country with the world's largest Muslim population. In 2019, Malaysia saw a 54 percent jump in the number of reported cases of sex trafficking in the country, with the vast majority relating to men exploiting their own wives, domestic workers or other women in the family. But police made just 14 convictions, and more than a third of victims with 1,590 women identified

across four states - are still being exploited, according to the government's annual antitrafficking report. "In the past, law enforcement and other agencies could always say that they have the knowledge, they have the laws, they have the capacity, they have the resources, they have the partners," said Anjali Raghavan, senior Asia researcher at the rights group Amnesty International. "But that is not enough because people are still being trafficked, they are still being abused." Officials blame

the failure on a lack of coordination and too much focus on anti-human trafficking legislation and mandatory sentences that focus on traffickers rather than their victims, she said. Last year, Malaysia was ranked as a Tier 2 country in the antitrafficking report, alongside countries such as China, India, the Philippines and Thailand. Traffickers in Malaysia are mainly from Bangladesh, Indonesia, Nepal and India, while most of the women and girls are from

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Malaysia, Cambodia and the Philippines, the report said. "PUSH-PULL" OF FORCED TRAFFICKING The Asian Development Bank has estimated trafficking of women for sex amounts to 20 percent of the world's total estimated \$150 billion in annual profits generated by traffickers. The Bank has said Asian countries are the source of 70 percent of women and girls trafficked for sex worldwide, but also noted 2d92ce491b
